1B CHAIRPERSONS REPORT

Report presented at August 2022 AGM.

Another busy year for all which has seen Covid overshadow the health service resulting in a lot of pressure put on our membership and indeed on our board, remembering that all of our board members work within our professions.

We have successfully changed over our website and a big thanks to our members for the patience they have shown with the change over and the constructive feedback provided as we fine tune the systems. I acknowledge that for some there is the need to reload information, but this will be a one off and as we move forward the new system will result in easier flow – if I can give our members one piece of advice – keep your CME uploads up to date.

We continue to support the role of Portfolio auditor and have been pleased by the improvement in the auditing processes we have achieved by establishing this role. We are also continuing to look at solutions for admin support for the board.

I have been involved in meetings this year set up by Martin Chadwick, Chief Allied Health Professions Officer, Ministry of Health looking at bringing the self-regulating professions together. Currently, we are just learning about each other and establishing some terms of reference and aims for the group.

Clinical Physiology is also one of the groups Martin Chadwick has identified within a group of at-risk professions and there are meetings bringing the professions together to look at things like education, training and professional pipelines. The board has had good representation within this space.

Lastly, I would like to thank the board members for their hard work and dedication. I want to also give a big thank you to outgoing members Fredric Doss and Belinda Buckley, thank you for your many years of service to the board and your professions. I look forward to working with the board and the new members the societies put forward as we negotiate our way through the changes that Te Whatu Ora will bring to our members.

1c Registrars Report

Report presented at August 2022 AGM

Another busy year for CPRB with a lot of time spent on the new website and sadly our Registrar Astrid resigning. I'd like to thank Astrid for her contribution and wish her well.

Statistical breakdown of Register 31/3/22

Total Registered: 520 (prev 488) with 54 new registrations.

• Total with current APC: 443 (prev 410)

• Total with overdue, lapsed or no APC: 48 (prev 55)

• On hold (Parental leave): 11 (prev 8)

Non-Resident: 17 (prev 15)Supervised: 92 (prev 67)

Scopes of Practice:

• Cardiac registrants: 270 (prev 259) 52% with 48 being Cardiac technicians

• Renal registrants: 78 (prev 74) 15%

Respiratory registrants: 60 (prev 56) 11%

• Exercise 45 (prev 40) 9%

• Sleep registrants: 45 (prev 37) 9%

• Neuro 21 (prev 22) 4%

Cardiac physiologists registered with CPRB who perform echocardiography as part of their role: 26, and as their only role 45 (total 71). According to the 2021 MRTB annual report 70 people are registered to practice Cardiac Sonography – it is unknown how many people are registered with both boards.

Applications:

<u>Registrations:</u> There were 54 new applications. 1 application was declined, and 1 was abandoned due to failure to complete the process.

PCAs: 1 competency assessment in Echocardiography was performed and passed on the first attempt.

<u>APCs:</u> The staggered renewals with Cardiac renewing in May, Renal in July, and all others by September continues to work well. I have been trying to re-upload all registration documents as time allows.

More statistical detail is available in the Annual Report.

CPRB Website:

The 'Wild Apricot' website (US) served its purpose and was deactivated. The transition to the new Gecco platform was more difficult than anticipated due to the company having to lockdown at home with no access to their proper high-spec work computers. They then encountered a backlog of work on return and consequently offered a more error-filled rushed service than normal. These issues are mostly resolved now, and I thank our registrants for their patience and help feeding back problems.

Portfolios:

We appointed a Portfolio manager Devina Pillay who is doing a wonderful job keeping the audits organised and flowing well.



The audit period for this year has been marked by positive progress in CPD portfolios. We have navigated through the challenges posed by the new website, addressing them effectively. Building on the previous CPRB meeting discussions, the shift towards submitting CPD via typed documents promises increased efficiency.

In terms of the auditing approach for this year, Devina identified and resolved evident issues that required attention. Instances such as insufficient CPD submissions or failure to meet the minimum requirements were promptly addressed. She reached out to the concerned registrants and guided them through rectifying these matters. Consequently, by the time she presented the CPD results to the board members, most issues had been resolved. The exceptions were limited to registrants who either declined communication or had exited the profession. The stats are presented below.

3a Summary of Projects and activities

POLICY

APC policy to formalize steps and timeline for APC issuance, and revoking if portfolio auditing is not complied with.

Pathway for overseas Sleep physiologist applicants was adapted.

A benchmarking exercise was completed to compare CPRB practices with other boards to identify and action any improvements to processes or policy. Policies and practices were found to be comparable and, in many cases, superior to similar sized boards. A result of this exercise was that board honoraria were paid for the first time in 2022.

ADMINISTRATIVE

New member administration website improved with fine tuning for CPRB requirements, e.g. APC module refinements, CPD module refinements and a search bar added.

Auditing of Cardiac, Renal, Sleep, Neuro and Clinical Exercise portfolios was undertaken.

Four board meetings and AGM held via Zoom.

Stripe payment gateway activated to reduce bank fees.

GENERAL

Application for HPCAA regulation formally withdrawn.

Meetings with the Allied Health Director to pursue formal recognition of self-regulation took place. Attendance at Allied Health Huis, discussing workforce issues, self-regulation, and educational pathways. Ongoing discussion with the Self-Regulating Professions Group and the MOH Regulation Reform project are in progress.

Work towards the feasibility of offering Sleep extended practices (for those practicing some aspects of Sleep scope, but are not Sleep Physiologists) is ongoing.

Constitution update has begun as required by the Register of Incorporated Societies.

POLICY

CPD submission standards to be set and conveyed to registrants, along with CPD exemplars.

ADMINISTRATIVE

Appointment of a new Registrar – recruitment, interviews, selection and training.

Registrar procedural guides for smoother transition to new appointments to this position.

Portfolio procedural guides.

GENERAL

Continue to engage with Ministry of Health to pursue formal recognition of self-regulated professions.

Constitution review – last reviewed 2014. This has become a priority due to the imminent legislation affecting Incorporated Societies, with a deadline of August 2023.


4A REGISTRATIONS AS AT 31/3/23

The Clinical Physiologists Registration Board (CPRB) is the registration board set up for Clinical Physiologists employed in New Zealand. If the professional society that a person belongs to is represented by the CPRB then that person can apply for registration with the CPRB. Currently registration with the CPRB is voluntary. Notwithstanding the voluntary nature of registration with the CPRB, the registration process is set up to meet the standards and requirements of the Health Practitioner Competence Assurance Act (2003).

Registration is awarded to a clinical physiologist when the CPRB is satisfied that the applicant meets specific competencies for a professional Scope of Practice.

When Registration is awarded the member's name is listed on the public Register of Clinical Physiologists


Demographics












Discussion – Registrants

The main contributor to decreased numbers of registrants, and number of echocardiography assessments was that less physiologists performing echocardiography renewed their registration. The number performing echocardiography-only dropped from 45 to 27 registered with CPRB. It is not known what proportion of these physiologists registered with MRTB instead or left the profession.

There was a noticeable decrease in overseas applicants from Australia, UK, South Africa, USA and Philippines. Applications from India and Indian trained physiologists applying from the Middle East increased.

The following groups are under-represented by the Physiologist workforce: New Zealand males, Māori, Pacific people, Europeans, Other ethnicities not specified.



Discussion - APCs

A larger number (107) of APCs had not been renewed by 31st March 2023 compared to the previous year (48). The APC renewal process changed due to the role out of the new website. A similar effect was seen in 2020 when paper-based APC submission changed to electronic uploading of forms. A reduction in Echocardiography renewals also contributed to this decrease.

A slight increase in numbers of physiologists with conditions on their APC was seen. These include overseas applicants requiring a competency assessment and new graduate physiologists.

CPRB requests full portfolio submission of a percentage of APC holders every year. This percentage varies across professional groups which are disparate in size. The purpose of auditing portfolios is to review the level and complexity of Continuing Professional development, and that this is appropriate to the physiologist's scope of practice and experience.

Failure to submit a portfolio can result in withdrawal or withholding of the practitioner's APC.

Practitioners submitting a portfolio considered inadequate in some way, are advised and supported to achieve an appropriate level of CPD. This is reviewed after a mandated period of time.

In the year 1/4/22-31/3/23 13% of registrants holding an APC were audited.

Portfolio Manager report:

Over the audit period, a discernible decline in portfolio professionalism has been observed. A prominent issue has been the legibility of the Continued Professional Development (CPD) forms, primarily because registrants, due to space constraints, are cramming their writing into these forms, resulting in illegible entries.

Another point of concern is a noticeable dip in competence levels among some registrants. Entries containing only one or two lines of CPD are inadequate in demonstrating their acquired knowledge, particularly given the structure of CPRB forms, which require registrants to articulate their learnings reflectively and comprehensibly.

An additional matter that requires attention is that some registrants are not submitting CPD forms but rather uploading evidence. At times, instead of reflecting and completing their CPD form, they prefer to present their notes for assessment of their learning.

Due to these concerns and in consultation with the respective board members, I have refrained from approving these portfolios. As CPRB, it is imperative to uphold a specific competence level and professionalism from our registrants to maintain the standards we aim for.

The board will endeavor to provide CPD exemplars to give registrants more understanding of the expected standard, and request that registrants type all CPD forms from September 2023 onwards.

Looking ahead to the upcoming Cardiac audit, a total of 103 portfolios scheduled for submission by September 2023 will be evaluated.

7A INCOME

- Income \$ 60884.00 an increase on previous year.
- While more registration and APC fees were received, there was a reduction in interest income due to interest rates falling.

7B EXPENDITURE

- Expenditure: \$60940, a significant increase on previous financial year.
- No expenditure on travel due to holding all virtual meetings via. Less tax paid as less interest earned. Budgeted website running costs did not eventuate due to a delay in the rollout of the website due to Covid-19.
- More expenditure on: Admin costs increased due to funding the Portfolio manager position, training of new Registrar, and admin hours working on and transitioning to the new website.
 Board honoraria payments were agreed by the membership and paid for the first time. A capital investment was made in the purchase of customized software for the new website.
 The financial auditors fee decreased as a review was performed rather than an audit.
